Active travel is the health solution staring us in the face – that's why we must continue to do all we can to ensure that young people have the skills and confidence to get about under their own steam.







My review of the year

Emily Cherry, Chief Executive at The Bikeability Trust

2023 was a record-breaking year for The Bikeability Trust.

Record funding of £50m from Active Travel England from April 2023 until the end of March 2025 meant that we reached more children than ever – with 310,367 children in 10,074 schools in England receiving Bikeability Levels 1 and 2 cycle training. That's a record number of children learning to cycle confidently and I am so proud of the impact we have made to so many children's lives.

In 2023 our Get Cycling in Schools pilot project started to make a real difference too. By training staff at primary schools to teach children skills on balance and pedal cycles, we can ensure that more children are ready to take part in Bikeability Levels 1 and 2. In fact, in one year alone, almost 400 schools took part, with 685 members of staff becoming new "Get Cycling Leads" and training almost 19,000 children!

Cycle to School Week is an important milestone in our calendar, and in 2023 a record 2300 pledges were made. Whether that's to swap a car journey for cycling; to cycle with family or to cycle to school, it's great to see children using their newfound cycling skills in a real life situation, to reinforce how cycle training provides the tools to enjoy a lifelong relationship with cycling - a healthy, cheap and sustainable way to have fun and travel.

As Minister Opperman points out, cycling also plays a vital role in meeting government targets for active travel. Bikeability is at the heart of the Active Travel England strategy to activate and increase cycling levels, and I won't rest until we achieve our ambition of offering cycle training to every child by 2025.

We couldn't do any of this without our industry – we get to recognise and thank the amazing instructors, grant recipients and training providers who make up the Bikeability family at the Celebration of Bikeability, which is the best part of my job. In fact, I enjoy nothing more than visiting Bikeability in action across the country to see for myself the impact that cycle training has in communities. There are so many more moments that have inspired me, but read on for a few highlights of my year. Record funding from Active Travel England

I kicked off the year with an important All Party Parliamentary Group for Cycling and Walking (APPGCW) meeting with the Minister of State in the Department for Transport, Jesse Norman, and the CEO of Active Travel England, Danny Williams, where they pledged support for our "every child" ambition.



A busy month! And my favourite day of the year - Bikeability conference day where we get to share everything that's great about The Bikeability Trust and our industry. I popped into Castle School in my home town of Cambridge which was the Bikeability School of the Year 2022. In September 2023 we teamed up with Sustrans for Cycle to School Week. Over 2300 children and young people pledged to make the school run fun by cycling, with an enthusiastic 1254 of them vowing to cycle to school every day. Swapping one car journey for cycling or going on a family ride were also popular options. We're grateful to everyone who made the week such a success, including footballer Bukayo Saka who set our social media ablaze after our poll named him as the celebrity most children would like to go on a cycle ride with.



Breaking Down Barriers

We believe that every child has the right to experience the benefits of cycling. However, a range of barriers prevent many from fully participating. The Bikeability Trust is committed to ensuring every child has the opportunity to learn to cycle.

15.9% of children in England have special educational needs or disabilities (SEND), and our data shows that 8% of Bikeability cycle training delivery was delivered to children with SEND in 2023/24. To improve this, in 2023 we launched dedicated SEND funding which enables local teams to provide adaptive sessions to those who can benefit.

Similarly, despite representing 36% of all schoolchildren in England, those from minority ethnic backgrounds remain less likely to access Bikeability cycle training, at 20%. By featuring and amplifying voices from minority ethnic backgrounds, such as inspiring cyclist Varun Jyothykumar and creating content for specific groups, such as how to cycle during Ramadan, we will inspire more children to cycle.

As Varun told us: "I'm really proud of the fact that I'm almost always the only Asian man and usually the only queer Asian man on the start line of all the ultra races I take part in. Regardless of what the result of any of the races are, it just feels like I'm making something of a difference to raise visibility."

The Bikeability Trust is committed to ensuring every child can access Bikeability and that's why we continue to remove barriers as part of our approach to prioritise inclusion.

£79,725

In 2023 we spent £79,725 on improving Special Educational Needs and Disabilities provision.



We funded 18 local authorities with £80,508 to deliver Bikeability cycle training to 4,769 children as part of the government's Holiday, Activities and Food Programme.



We provided 1024 fleet cycles to increase access to cycles for children in areas of deprivation.

Learning Together

To support instructors to confidently deliver inclusive Bikeability sessions, we launched mandatory training in Special Educational Needs or Disabilities (SEND) in Feb 2023. We worked closely with Wheels for All, teachers and other SEND specialists, to devise the 90-minute online training module. The training is tailored to help instructors develop the skills and confidence to teach children with special educational needs or disabilities to cycle.

More than 1500 instructors completed the training in 2023, with most finding the practical focus useful and reporting improved confidence when delivering inclusive cycling sessions.

Wheels for Wellbeing also delivered disability awareness training to The Trust's Communications and Development teams at the start of 2023. The training explained the empowering nature of the social model of disability, which puts the focus on society to enable positive change. We continue to consult with disability rights organisations including Wheels for All and Wheels for Wellbeing, to ensure that the voices of disabled people are always included in what we do.

Cycling For All

A new section of the website was created to provide information and inspiration to anyone interested in inclusive cycling, whether they have Paralympic ambitions or just want to find a group to ride with. By signposting to organisations which offer support and advice, we hope to help riders go further on their cycling journey – it received over 1000 views in 2023.

Get Cycling in Schools

This new project addresses another barrier to inclusion. By training teaching staff to teach basic cycling skills to children as young as three, the aim is that more children will be ready for Bikeability Levels 1 and 2 later in their school career. Participating schools also receive a fleet of balance cycles, provided by Squish, Frog, Decathlon and Halfords, with the option to win additional pedal cycles in return for the timely reporting of data.

Schools and Project Coordination Officer Amy Glen said:

"I am delighted that the project has helped nearly 19,000 children to experience the joy of cycling already. I have heard from so many schools that the children love the sessions, with some of them transitioning from balance to pedal cycles on the same day! As a bonus, thanks to the teachers, around 4750 hours of instructor time was saved, meaning that instructors can concentrate on the delivery of our Level 2 targets." "It has been fantastic to see the impact of the scheme... many of our youngest children in school are now able to ride a two-wheeled bike unaided. This is a phenomenal achievement" Mill Hill Primary, Stoke on Trent

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Access to Cycles

2022's Widening Participation Fund projects showed how improving access to cycles means greatly increased delivery of Bikeability Levels 1&2.

In 2023 we funded 1024 brand new Frog and Squish fleet cycles to help 52 grant recipients and training providers deliver more Balance, Learn to Ride and Level 1 and 2 training. And deliver they did, with the cycles being used an estimated 16,000 times throughout the year!

Development Project Manager Mike Holwill said: "This was a really worthwhile use of funds, which made a direct impact where it was most needed by removing the barrier of access to cycles experienced by many children."

Scaling Up Coming Soon...

We're not stopping there as further funds will be available in 2024 to increase delivery of Bikeability cycle training. Our Scaling Up programme will offer a range of support to selected grant recipients, meaning that more children will be able to develop their cycling skills.

Working Together

As a small charity with 23 staff, The Bikeability Trust's teams work closely together to manage and develop the Bikeability programme, continuously improving what we do to support grant recipients, training providers and instructors.

In 2023:



We reviewed and improved the instructor, training provider and grant recipient renewal process, following industry feedback.



We added more detailed information to the website to help grant recipients with their internal quality assurance.

Grants Officer Joanne Metcalfe said:

"The Grants and Operations teams are here to keep the Bikeability wheels rolling! Our priority is to engage with industry to make sure the guidance and support we provide meets their needs."

Operations Manager Louise Sanders added: "We really enjoyed working together to review the internal quality assurance guidance, which grant recipients have reported is helpful. It really shows how important it is for the Trust to work closely with the Bikeability industry."

Delivering Collaboration: the Development and Communications Teams



In 2023 The Bikeability Trust updated the Cycle Training

Delivery Guide, which was a real joint effort. The guide outlines the practices and principles that all instructors should be aware of when teaching children and adults to cycle. The Development and Communications teams worked with experts from across the industry, including instructors, to make the guide easier to use, more readable and more inclusive.

Senior Project Officer Patrick Jarman said:

"The Delivery Guide is a core piece of work, which demonstrates not just our focus on delivery being more inclusive and accessible, but what we can achieve when we work together. The Communications team at The Trust and experienced industry friends worked very closely with us and provided invaluable input. We had 1777 downloads in 2023 and positive feedback from instructors, so I'm confident that the new guide will allow instructors to continue providing engaging and rewarding Bikeability sessions."

- Video content has been included for the first time in a delivery guide, to bring the content to life
- A new Ride Guide provides a detailed description of how to cycle, both on and off-road
- New Activity Templates will help instructors to teach cycling skills in fun and active ways

Working with Industry

Communication

To support industry effectively, two way communication is essential. In 2023, a combination of quarterly meetings, webinars and other contact enabled us to share and take on information and feedback. We also:



- Sent 150 email campaigns, including newsletters, surveys and project involvement opportunities to grant recipients, training providers, instructors, partners and schools with average open rate of 52.5%
- Reviewed the content and frequency of the Bikeability Club newsletter, which shares blog content, competitions and encouragement to keep cycling to 6643 subscribers
- Produced 16 news articles on the website and published 44 blog posts
- Held nine interactive webinars for industry: two Ask The Trust; four on digitisation; two on Cycle Training Delivery Guide, with a total of 461 attendees
- Launched a media toolkit for training providers to help with VIP and Ministerial visits and promoting their training

Children and adults learning a skill for life, while having lots of fun along the way, genuinely, what's not to love about that?"





The annual conference is a great opportunity for The Bikeability Trust to hear directly from those who keep the wheels of Bikeability turning - the instructors, training providers and grant recipients. In 2023, the theme was impact. Over 200 delegates came together in Birmingham in March to hear about the impact Bikeability can have on both individuals and communities.



The day ended in style with speaker Phillip Darnton OBE, honorary patron of The Bikeability Trust, sharing his highlights.

Innovation

In 2023 The Bikeability Trust's Development team continued to come up with fresh ways of getting more people cycling, proving once again that thinking outside the (bike) box is their speciality!

Immerse for Success

How can immersive reality improve children's performance and interest levels in cycle training? This exciting project merges cycling, education and cutting-edge technology to find out. After years of development, Director of Research Dr Dan Bishop of Brunel University, took his project on the road in 2023, working with Bikeability training providers across England, to see how Year 6 children respond to high-tech cycle training!

Dan said: "We now have some fantastic data which shows that combining immersive cycle training and on-road experience improves all four key skills needed for confident cycling. It could be a really useful training and assessment tool as an indicator of a rider's 'road readiness'".

In a busy year for Dan, the project was showcased at an All Party Parliamentary Group for Cycling and Walking event at the House of Commons as well as at the National Cycling Show, attracting a good deal of curiosity and interest. The next step is to trial whether large-group immersive training in classrooms could support Bikeability instructors and training providers nationwide.

Football Project Kicks Off

In possibly our most innovative project yet, we're bringing the worlds of cycling and football together by funding community football coaches to train as Bikeability cycle instructors. A new Recognised Prior Learning course means that coaches can be fast-tracked to start delivering cycle training to young people in their local communities. As well as offering coaches and their clubs a potential income stream, the project aims to increase the numbers and diversity of Bikeability cycle instructors. Football Development Manager Nick Ridgway, a qualified Bikeability instructor and UEFA A qualified football coach, was excited to watch coaches at Port Vale in his hometown of Stoke-on-Trent start their instructor training with GoVelo in November.



Nick said: "The coaches already have many of the skills needed to be Bikeability instructors, so it was great to see them in action learning the cycling-specific content of the training course. I look forward to working with many more clubs and helping them to make a real difference to young people."

Look Ahead: Andrew Milbourne, Chair of Trustees, The Bikeability Trust

The benefits of learning to cycle confidently cannot be overstated. The Bikeability Trust's role is to equip children and adults with the skills to unlock those benefits through the Bikeability programme.



As a former headteacher and an enthusiast of cycling for local journeys, I feel very strongly that learning to cycle is a hugely important life skill for children. Although appointed Chair in 2023, I have been a trustee since 2019 and have seen the charity grow in size and influence, while never losing sight of its core purpose.

In 2023, the Trust has once again broken records in terms of the number of children who have taken part in cycle training, and we are well on the way to our ambition of reaching five million children by 2025.

There are many people who have contributed to this achievement – as well as everyone who works for The Bikeability Trust, there is a whole team of training providers, grant recipients and, of course, instructors, who have worked tirelessly to make it happen. None of this is possible without the commitment and funding from Active Travel England, the body responsible for ensuring that everyone has the greatest opportunity possible to walk, wheel or cycle short journeys. We must also thank Ministers Jesse Norman and Guy Opperman, for their valuable support in 2023.

Regardless of how the new political landscape looks in the second half of 2024, we will continue to speak up for the Bikeability programme at the highest levels, lobbying the new government for the longer-term funding needed to ensure continuity and sustainability. We will also continue to advocate for Bikeability training to be offered to every child in England.

To assist industry, we will match our words with actions and offer financial support in areas where delivery levels are lowest in 2024. It's vital that we continue to take a pragmatic approach to tackling the four major challenges faced by industry, to realise the aim of reaching every child.

To summarise:

Instructor capacity

The creation of a new Recognised Delivery Centre will increase instructor capacity, by providing more training places and improving consistency. Our football pilot project will explore a new route to fast-track football coaches into qualifying as cycle instructors. Underpinning these actions will be the redevelopment of the Level 2 Award in Instructing Cycle Training. It will be standardised across the country and backed with new e-learning to support the practical course.

Access to cycles

We are working with commercial partners to improve access to cycles and have already provided fleets of cycles to schools through the Get Cycling in Schools project.

Reaching every school

We will commission a marketing education campaign to explore ways to better engage with schools and continue to lobby Department for Education for Bikeability to be on the curriculum.

Engaging parents and carers

Our Digitisation project will transform the way we communicate with parents and children, giving us the opportunity to engage with every participant directly for the first time through a new Bikeability Club website.

There is much happening, and I look forward to tracking our progress in achieving our strategic milestones in the coming year and beyond!
